


The National Hispanic University: Pre-College Programs **TRIO Student heads to Harvard** As we celebrate the end of the school year, we Take a Look

Parents learned about the various type of financial aid, the different systems of higher education in California and high school graduation requirements. TRiO is dedicated in making sure students and parents receive the necessary support and motivation in order to get to college.

Middle School Does it Too!

The Middle School Program rocked this year! Lilian Zelaya, our middle school advisor is also an Alumni of the TRiO (3-1-3) program which guided her through the necessary steps to pursue higher education. Lilian understands how challenging it was to navigate through the process of pursuing college. As the middle school advisor she is able to assist and motivate middle school students who would be the first generation in their family to go to College. Students from our schools have participated in various workshops, such as Goal Setting, A-G Requirements and Four Systems of Higher Education. The goal of the workshops was to increase student knowledge on the necessary requirements for college, ease the transition from middle school to high school and provide the students with an opportunity to begin planning their futures. During one of the workshops students were able to learn the importance of setting short term and long term goals. Students also developed their own academic plan which would help them memorize the A-G Requirements, which are the classes needed in order to be eligible for a university. Students also participated in a workshop was designed

to help students identify the type of lifestyle they want to the type of career they can pursue in the future. Students worked on an interactive internet site where they picked the type of lifestyle they want and how this interconnects to pursuing higher education and getting into a career that will provide enough financial stability to fit the type of lifestyle. Aside from workshops, our middle schools have participated in the college tours, cultural field trips, and tutoring services. Thanks to the collaboration and support from our administrators and counselors, TRiO has been able to establish successful tutoring sites at Pala, Castillero and Hoover Middle Schools. What's Happening in Upward Bound?

The 2009 Upward Bound Summer Residential Program (SRP) will be held at the National Hispanic University from June 29th-July 10th and at the University of California Santa Cruz from July 13th-August 7th. Forty-three high school students will participate in the six-week summer program that will encompass a commuter style college experience and an on-campus living college experience. The Summer Residential will include 2 academic classes; English and Math, enrichment courses, cultural, and recreational activities that are designed to enrich the students ability to succeed in college. College represents a very different and far more demanding lifestyle than high school, which the students needs to become



familiar with before going to the next level. Coping with so many changes include adjusting to a new environment and meeting many rigorous academic expectations while balancing work, school and study schedules with personal and family commitments. During this six-week period the students will establish a personal support system by meeting new friends and members of University community that will empower them to achieve their higher education commitments.



The College Center is composed of Academic Advisors, our Project Director, Students and more importantly our PALS. The Peer Advisor for Learning Skills (also known as tutors) provide group and individual tutoring services. They advise students on how to improve their study skills: explain concepts, principles, and terminology. The Pre-College PALS are an intricate part of the pre-college experience. They serve as a liaison between students, parents, teachers, and advisors. They provide a fun and learning environment for

Esperanza Educational Talent Search Upward Bound Pre-College TRIO Programs

The mission of the Pre-College Programs is to improve educational experience of under-represented students by promoting success based academic and social development activities that will coordinate home and school efforts to impact poor retention of low-income, first generation college students in the United States in post-secondary education.

The National Hispanic University currently hosts two pre-college programs; the Esperanza Educational Talent Search (EETS) and Upward Bound (UB) Programs. The EETS program is designed to prepare and assist low-income and first generation middle school and high school students for college. The program provides academic, career, and financial advising. EETS serves over 1,200 students from the San Jose Unified, East Union High School and Alum Rock Union School Districts. The Upward Bound Program offers intensive academic assistance and college preparation to 64 high school students from low-income and first generation families. The program offers academic advising, Saturday academy and a Summer Residential Program.
